Drug Enforcement

Lincoln High School and Lincoln PD continue to combat the drug issues in our community by utilizing the ISP K-9 training academy to search for drugs in our schools.

The War on Drugs

The Lincoln Police Department has been very active over the years combating drugs in our community. There was a “black tar” heroin issue years ago, but users transitioned to other drugs from cocaine and crack to methamphetamines.

Although it is a felony offense to possess certain controlled substances, users sometimes are arrested more frequently by patrol officers as it is found on persons and vehicles most often. However as we continue to see that some drugs have a powerful influence due to addiction and then dependency on these drugs, we have focused to more of a rehabilitative approach to users and focusing our investigations and resources on the dealers of these deadly drugs.

Just over the last year our officers have targeted several heroin dealers and essentially “dried up” Lincoln. However the users are now going to other larger cities around us to obtain their drugs and are transitioning to other drugs like meth to “get their fix”.

As discussed in several meetings, we need to enhance our education to our children to inform them of the addictiveness and dangers of these drugs and for the State legislature to provide more resources for rehabilitation for those that seek help.

MONTHLY STATISTICS


Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR)





DARE/Community Policing

April 2nd: Lincoln YMCA had an archery class with kids under the age of 18. Officer Christy Fruge stopped by and watched the kids and talked with some of the parents. The kids were shooting at balloons for prizes. While at the event, the group ran out of prizes. D.A.R.E. gave 10 free movie passes, as additional prizes, for the kids to finish the event.

April 14th: Officer Christy Fruge went to Head Start, in Lincoln, and read a book to 4 different pre-school classes. After reading the book, the kids were able to see my squad car. I gave all of them pencils and stickers. They were so happy to spend some time with me!

April 20th: Deputy Chief Vlahovich, Sgt. Miles Craig, Officer Michael Fruge and Officer Christy Fruge took around 250 kids (from Lincoln Junior High, Carroll Catholic, Chester East Lincoln and West Lincoln Broadwell) to Peoria to watch a Peoria Chiefs Baseball game. Each student and chaperone received admission into the game and lunch for free from the D.A.R.E. program.

April 22nd: Every year Cpl. Maurice Johnson participates in a bike ride across Illinois for officers that have been killed in the line of duty. Each rider raises money that is used to support the families that are left behind from these tragic situations. This year the D.A.R.E. program donated \$250 to this event.

April 24th: Lincoln D.A.R.E. donated money to the Lincoln Youth Football program.

April 28th: On February 6th, 2016, Brendan Armbrust was hit by a truck and suffered multiple injuries. A benefit will be held on May 22, 2016, to raise money for Brendan and his family. Lincoln D.A.R.E. purchased and delivered a 44 inch television to be auctioned off at the event. Fingers crossed it raises tons of money for Brendan!

LCHS School Resource Officer

Officer Tim Butterfield responded to 89 incidents at LCHS during April 2016. The most common offenses for April were Harassment/Bullying, Class Misconduct, Social/Emotional, Assault/Threat, and General Misconduct where the parents were contacted. Officer Butterfield has begun the spring CPFS campaign. He created a staff photo book log for the 16/17 school year. The LCHS School Board approved Officer Butterfields soft lock down recommendation. On April 22, 2016, Officer Butterfield organized a K-9 search of the school with the Illinois State Police. The search included 8 dogs.
