

**2016 Annual Summary**

The Lincoln Police Department implemented a new mission statement in 2016 to help align ourselves better with our community. This includes getting our community involved, communicating better, being transparent, and reducing crime.

All these are steps to help give our citizens peace of mind, a sense of security, and establish safety. The numbers represented in our Uniform Crime Report (UCR) is a state and federal mandate to report these crimes. We also must report arrests in these areas along with arrests in drug crimes.

While the Lincoln Police Department attempts to safeguard the community in these UCR reported offenses, we must also handle incidents involving neighbor disputes to homeland security issues. We also respond to complaints to speeding, stop sign violations, and other traffic issues.

In 2016 we responded to 20673 incidents, we made 1900 traffic stops, wrote 1200 tickets, wrote 1100 written warnings, responded to 400 traffic accidents, made 850 arrests, and took 1461 case reports.

Our narcotics officers opened 20 felony cases; made 46 felony arrests; seized 240grams of cocaine, 14.5 grams of heroin, 1519 grams of methamphetamine, 30 grams of opiates, and 377 pounds of cannabis. This is approximately \$3.5 million in street value narcotics. Those 20 cases yielded 46 arrests and 101 charges of which there was 32 Class X felonies charged. These arrests were those that were dealing these hazardous drugs in our community.

The men and women of the Lincoln Police Department do their best at patrolling our streets, visiting our schools, and being proactive in our enforcement. Last year our officers made 1500 contacts to help promote community policing.

As the Police Chief, I simply ask our community to help do your civic duty to assist your local law enforcement agency. Call if you see something suspicious in your neighborhood. Try to remember license plates and detailed vehicle or clothing descriptions. Don't be an easy target, lock the doors to your vehicles, garages, and home.

We hope to soon have an online mapping and alert system so you can be more aware of what is happening on your neighborhood, so you can be more involved. Simply relying on your local law enforcement will contribute to more crime as our resources are small, but together we can do so much more!


## Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR)




