Also present were Fire Chief Miller, Street Superintendent Mr. Landers, Safety and Building Officer Mr. Lebegue, American Water Manager Mr. Ferguson, and Police Chief Adams. Also present were Mayor Neitzel, City Treasurer Mr. Conzo, City Administrator Mr. Johnson, City Attorney Mr. Blinn Bates, City Clerk Mrs. Gehlbach, and Recording Secretary Mrs. Riggs.

Lincoln Park District – Hold Harmless Agreement:

City Administrator Mr. Johnson said this Agreement is for the Park District mowing the City of Lincoln Parks and have also done some of the City right of ways. The City of Lincoln Street Department is now mowing Wyatt Avenue. There has never been an agreement between the Park District and the City of Lincoln. Everyone agreed to place this on the Agenda for Monday, June 20, 2016.

Financing of Replacement Police Department Fleet Vehicles:

Police Chief Adams said at budget time they talked about getting 2.5% financing for the new cars. Deputy Chief Vhalovich went out checking on financing and got 2% financing through Illini Bank. Alderman Hoefle and Alderman Tibbs commended them for their work on keeping the cost down. Alderman Hoinacki asked to have this on the Agenda for Monday, June 20, 2016.

Third Friday May 26 Revenue/Expense Report:

Alderman Tibbs said the ITEP grant for the streetscape and felt there should be discussion about a bicycle path for downtown (she did not feel that a bike path through downtown Lincoln would be acceptable). The businesses have been approached about the new streetscape. City Administrator Mr. Johnson said what Alderman Tibbs is talking about are actually conceptual plans and once they receive the design plans they will bring those before the City Council to review and discuss.

Alderman Hoefle said today was Flag Day and the flags are flying proudly at Pekin Street Veterans Park.

Alderman Hoefle said a new walking track behind the Oasis will be breaking ground at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday, June 16, 2016.

Alderman Horn wanted to know about the bicycle trails. There has not been a Regional Planning Commission meeting for two months.

ORDINANCE NO. 652

5-3-4: BURNING IN CITY:

I. (A) The area within the city which is bounded as follows hereby is declared to be the business district of the city:

Beginning at the intersection of the Southwest Line of Keokuk Street with the Southeast right-of-way line of the Gulf, Mobile & Ohio Railroad; thence Southwesterly along said right-of-way line to the Southwest Line of Pekin Street, thence Northwesterly along said Southwest Line of Pekin Street to the alley between Kankakee Street and Logan Street; thence Southwesterly along the Southeast Line of said alley to Clinton Street, thence Southeasterly along the Southwest Line of Clinton Street to Logan Street; thence Southwesterly along the Southeast Line of Logan Street to Decatur Street; thence Southeasterly along the Southwest Line of Decatur Street to Hamilton Street; thence Northeasterly along the Southeast Line of Hamilton Street to Clinton Street, thence Southeasterly along the Southwest Line of Clinton Street to Sherman Street; thence Northeasterly along the Southeast Line of Sherman Street to Pekin Street; thence Northwesterly along the Northeast Line of Pekin Street to Kickapoo Street; thence Northeasterly along the Southeast Line of Kickapoo Street to Delavan Street, thence Northeasterly along the Northeast Line of Delavan Street to the alley between Chicago Street and Kickapoo Street; thence Northeasterly along the Southeast Line of the last-mentioned alley to Tremont Street; thence Northwesterly along the Northeast Line of Tremont Street to Chicago Street, thence Northeasterly along the Southeast Line of Chicago Street to Keokuk Street; and thence Northwesterly along the Southwest Line of Keokuk Street to the point of beginning.

(B) No person shall kindle or maintain any open fire anywhere within the boundaries of the business district described in subsection (A) of this section, and no person shall permit or suffer the kindling or maintenance of any open fire upon any premises located within the district which may be owned or controlled by him.

(C) No person shall construct, maintain or employ, or shall permit or suffer the construction, maintenance or employment of any incinerator or other device for the destruction by fire of wastepaper, garbage or other refuse anywhere within the boundaries of the business district described in subsection (A) of this section, unless the incinerator or other device be constructed wholly of fireproof material and be housed completely, save for its smoke outlet, within a building situated within the district. It shall be the duty of the owner and tenant of any premises located within the business district whereon any type of burner or incinerator other than the type prescribed in this subsection is situated, to destroy, remove or block up such type of burner or incinerator.

(D) Any violation of subsections (B) and (C) of this section shall be punishable by a fine of not less than twenty five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

(E) No person shall set fire to any items, whether it be leaves, rubbish or other combustible material within the city limits unless that burning is as follows:

Tent Structure Requirements

BOCA National Fire Prevention Code 1996, Chapter 20, Section F-2001.0

Tents covering over 900 square feet including all areas with a common means of egress or with an occupant load of 50 people or more, shall be inspected and approved by Lincoln Fire Department Inspection Department.

A Site plan must be submitted with application with occupant loads of 100 or more occupants:

1. Must indicate egress facility minimum two exits marked
2. Must indicate seating capacity
3. Must indicate arrangement of seating
4. Must indicate location of heating and electrical equipment

Tent Owner shall have documentation of Inspection and maintenance records.

All anchors shall be inspected and follow other city requirements.

Combustible materials such as hay, straw, shavings or similar materials shall not be located within any tent used as assembly occupancy. Combustible materials and vegetation shall be kept 20' from the structure, and combustible trash shall be removed at the end of the day/night.

Exposed flames from cooking appliances shall be kept 20' from tent.

Clearance of 3' from all contents inside the tent shall be maintained from the tent fabric.

Fire extinguishers are required 1 4-A rated or two 2-A shall be provided.

RE: Amendment to Comcast Franchise Agreement

Background

Since 1994, the City has maintained a franchise agreement with the cable company operating in the community. At that time, Continental Cablevision was the operator of the cable franchise, which was later purchased by Comcast. With that purchase, Comcast assumed the provisions of that agreement, which is set to expire September 1, 2019.

Analysis/Discussion

Part of this agreement pertains to the use of the Emergency Alert System (EAS). Comcast has approached the City wishing to update the language of that section. The new language references that the EAS will be provided and maintained according to federal regulation. The language has been reviewed and found acceptable by Mr. Bates. The verbiage from the current agreement is included and highlighted for your reference.

FRANCHISE AMENDMENT

THIS FRANCHISE AMENDMENT AGREEMENT, effective as of _____, 2016 between the City of Lincoln, Illinois, the Local Franchising Authority (the "LFA"), and Comcast of Illinois/ Indiana/ Ohio, LLC. ("Comcast")

WHEREAS, the LFA has granted Comcast a non-exclusive franchise to construct, operate and maintain a cable television system (the "Franchise"); and

WHEREAS, Section 19 of the Comcast franchise provides the opportunity for Comcast to request the modification of the Franchise Agreement;

WHEREAS, the City was notified by Comcast of its intent to amend the franchise;

NOW THEREFORE THE PARTIES HAVE AGREED TO AMEND THE COMCAST FRANCHISE AS BELOW:

Section 1

Section 10(d) of the Franchise is hereby amended by eliminating the existing section and replacing it with the following:

"Emergency Alerts. At all times during the term of this Franchise Agreement, the Grantee shall provide and maintain an "Emergency Alert System" ("EAS") consistent with applicable Federal law and regulation – including 47 C.F.R., Part 11 and the "State of Illinois Emergency Alert System State Plan" – as may be amended from time to time. Should the City become qualified and authorized to activate the EAS, the Grantee shall provide instructions on the access and use of the EAS by the City to the City on an annual basis.

Section 2

Except as specifically modified hereby, the Franchise shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 3

Neither party waives any right which it enjoys under law as a result of agreeing to this Franchise amendment.

In the event that any provision of this agreement or the application thereof shall to any extent be invalid and/ or unenforceable, then the remainder of the agreement and/ or the application of such provision to persons or circumstances other than those to which the agreement is invalid and/ or unenforceable shall not be affected thereby.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties hereto have executed this agreement as of the date of signature of all parties.

(c) To enhance and improve the overall technical and picture quality of its CATV system, the Company plans to rebuild the system by no later than December 31, 1994. Such a rebuild will increase the system's bandwidth to a minimum of 550 MHz, supplying capacity for 78 channels. The system will be designed to meet or exceed ALL FCC Rules and Regulations regarding technical standards and will be built with addressability or comparable technology. The Company shall notify the City prior to the beginning of construction along with a report of the system rebuild. The Company shall provide progress reports of the rebuild, at the City's request.

(d) The Company shall design and construct the CATV system to provide for an audio override of all channels during emergencies or disasters, whereby a designee of the City approved by the Company may introduce an audio message on all channels of the CATV system simultaneously.

(e) The Company shall make available to its subscribers, a signal scrambling device capable of rendering cable service inaccessible or accessible, subject to the subscriber's discretion.

(f) To better educate and inform its subscribers, the Company shall continue, at its own expense, to cablecast the meetings of the full Council as part of the Company's commitment to Local Origination programming.

(g) The Company shall provide audio services.

Section 11. - OPERATIONAL STANDARDS.

(a) The Company shall operate and maintain its CATV system in full compliance with the standards set forth by the Federal Communications Commission. Procedures for testing the technical capacity of the system shall conform with the standards applied to CATV systems by the Federal Communications Commission.

(b) Whenever it is necessary to shut off or interrupt service for the purpose of making repairs, installations, or adjustments, the Company shall do so at such times as will cause the least amount of inconvenience to its customers and unless such interruption is of short duration or is unforeseen and immediately necessary, it shall give reasonable notice thereof to its customers.

Section 12. - LOCAL OFFICE; COMPLAINTS; AND, CUSTOMER SERVICE OBLIGATIONS.

(a) The Company shall maintain a business office which subscribers may telephone during regular business hours without incurring added message or toll charges, so that CATV maintenance service shall be promptly available. Should a subscriber have an unresolved complaint regarding the quality of Cable Service,

RESOLUTION 2016-325

RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING WORK RATES
FOR THE
CITY OF LINCOLN

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by the State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by any one under contract for public works," approved June 26, 1941, codified as amended, 820 ILCS 130/1 et seq. (1993), formerly Ill. Rev. Stat., Ch. 48, par. 39s-1 et seq. and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Act requires that the City Council of the City of Lincoln, County of Logan, investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in said Act for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of Logan County, employed in performing construction of public works, for said City of Lincoln.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL, OF THE CITY OF LINCOLN:

SECTION 1: To the extent and as required by "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by any one under contract for public works," approved June 26, 1941, as amended, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the City of Lincoln is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in Logan County area as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of July, 2015, a copy of that determination being attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. As required by said Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois shall supersede the Department's June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the City of Lincoln. The definition of any terms appearing in this Resolution which are also used in aforesaid Act shall be the same as in said Act.

SECTION 2: Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained

any work or employment except public works construction of the City of Lincoln to the extent required by the aforesaid Act.

SECTION 3: The City of Lincoln shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main entrance of City Hall of the City of Lincoln, this determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifications.

SECTION 4: The City of Lincoln shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.

SECTION 5: The City of Lincoln shall promptly file a certified copy of this Resolution with both the Secretary of State Index Division and the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois.

SECTION 6: The City of Lincoln shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area a copy of this Resolution, and such publication shall constitute notice that the determination is effective and that this is the determination of this public body.

Explanations**LOGAN COUNTY**

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

Oil and chip resealing (O&C) means the application of road oils and liquid asphalt to coat an existing road surface, followed by application of aggregate chips or gravel to coated surface, and subsequent rolling of material to seal the surface.

EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

CERAMIC TILE FINISHER, MARBLE FINISHER, TERRAZZO FINISHER

Assisting, helping or supporting the tile, marble and terrazzo mechanic by performing their historic and traditional work assignments required to complete the proper installation of the work covered by said crafts. The term "Ceramic" is used for naming the classification only and is in no way a limitation of the product handled. Ceramic takes into consideration most hard tiles.

ELECTRONIC SYSTEMS TECHNICIAN

Installation, service and maintenance of low-voltage systems which utilizes the transmission and/or transference of voice, sound, vision,

or digital for commercial, education, security and entertainment purposes for the following: TV monitoring and surveillance, background/foreground music, intercom and telephone interconnect, field programming, inventory control systems, microwave transmission, multi-media, multiplex, radio page, school, intercom and sound burglar alarms and low voltage master clock systems.

Excluded from this classification are energy management systems, life safety systems, supervisory controls and data acquisition systems not intrinsic with the above listed systems, fire alarm systems, nurse call systems and raceways exceeding fifteen feet in length.

SURVEY WORKER - Operated survey equipment including data collectors, G.P.S. and robotic instruments, as well as conventional levels and transits.

TRUCK DRIVER - BUILDING, HEAVY AND HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

Class 1. Drivers on 2 axle trucks hauling less than 9 ton. Air compressor and welding machines and brooms, including those pulled by separate units, truck driver helpers, warehouse employees, mechanic helpers, greasers and tiremen, pickup trucks when hauling materials, tools, or workers to and from and on-the-job site, and fork lifts up to 6,000 lb. capacity.

Class 2. Two or three axle trucks hauling more than 9 ton but hauling less than 16 ton. A-frame winch trucks, hydrolift trucks, vector trucks or similar equipment when used for transportation purposes. Fork lifts over 6,000 lb. capacity, winch trucks, four axle combination units, and ticket writers.

Class 3. Two, three or four axle trucks hauling 16 ton or more. Drivers on water pulls, articulated dump trucks, mechanics and working forepersons, and dispatchers. Five axle or more combination units.

Class 4. Low Boy and Oil Distributors.

Class 5. Drivers who require special protective clothing while employed on hazardous waste work.

TRUCK DRIVER - OIL AND CHIP RESEALING ONLY.

This shall encompass laborers, workers and mechanics who drive contractor or subcontractor owned, leased, or hired pickup, dump, service, or oil distributor trucks. The work includes transporting materials and equipment (including but not limited to, oils, aggregate supplies, parts, machinery and tools) to or from the job site; distributing oil or liquid asphalt and aggregate; stock piling material when in connection with the actual oil and chip contract. The Truck Driver (Oil & Chip Resealing) wage classification does not include supplier delivered materials.

Paving Mixers; Piledrivers; Pipe Wrapping and Painting Machines; Pushdozers, or Push Cats; Robotic Controlled Equipment in this Classification; Rock Crushers; Ross Carrier or Similar Machines; Rotomill; Scoops, Skimmer, two cu. yd. capacity and under; Scoops, All or Tournapull; Sheep-Foot Roller (Self Propelled); Shovels; Skid Steer; Skimmer Scoops; Temporary Concrete Plant Operators; Test Hole Drilling Machines; Tower Machines; Tower Mixers; Track Type End Loaders; Track Type Fork Lifts or High Lifts; Track Jacks and Tampers; Tractors, Sideboom; Trenching or Ditching Machine; Tunnelluggers; Vermeer Type Saws; Water Blaster Cutting Head; Wheel Type End Loaders; Winch Cat.

* Combinations of one to eight of any Air Compressors, Conveyors, Welding Machines, Water Pumps, Light Plants, or Generators shall be in batteries or within 400 feet and shall be paid as per the Classification Schedule contained in this Article.

*Combinations of one to eight of any Air Compressors, Conveyors, Welding Machines, Water Pumps, Light Plants or Generators shall be in batteries or within 400 feet and shall be paid as per the Classification Schedule contained in this Article.

Other Classifications of Work:

For definitions of classifications not otherwise set out, the Department generally has on file such definitions which are available. If a task to be performed is not subject to one of the classifications of pay set out, the Department will upon being contacted state which neighboring county has such a classification and provide such rate, such rate being deemed to exist by reference in this document. If no neighboring county rate applies to the task, the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing

classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

NOTE TO LOCAL OFFICIALS REGARDING CURRENT PREVAILING WAGES AND PREVAILING WAGE ORDINANCES/RESOLUTIONS

Under the Prevailing Wage Act (820 ILCS 130/9), the Illinois Department of Labor is required to “investigate and ascertain prevailing wage” and benefit rates every year during the month of June. That process is currently underway. New rates will be posted after that process is completed. We expect new rates to appear at the end of July 2016.

Until then, **the rates published in July 2015 remain in effect.** These can be found on our website at <http://www.illinois.gov/idol/Laws-Rules/CONMED/rates/2015/july/county.htm>

The Prevailing Wage Act also requires that local governments adopt prevailing wage rates, and provide copies to the Illinois Department of Labor. The Department will accept ordinances and/or resolutions that cite the most recent prevailing wage rates. (i.e. the July 2015 rates.) The Prevailing Wage Act also allows local governments to investigate and ascertain their own prevailing wage rates.

If you have NOT already forwarded your 2016 ordinance, the Illinois Department of Labor requests that ordinances be scanned and uploaded to the State’s Secure File Transfer Protocol (FTP) Site <https://filet.illinois.gov/filet/PIMupload.asp>. Follow the 4 steps:

- (1) For RECIPIENT EMAIL ADDRESS, insert DOL.PWOrdinances@Illinois.gov
- (2) Insert YOUR EMAIL Address in second box.

Background

Each year, the City must establish and provide a budget and design guidelines to the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) for its expenditures using Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) proceeds. The uses of MFT funds are limited to the engineering, labor, maintenance, and construction of roadways. Last year, we moved the MFT program's applicable dates from a calendar year basis to a fiscal year basis to better coincide with our budget. In order to be able to be reimbursed for the use of these funds, the state must approve the planned expenditures.

Analysis/Discussion

In this year's program, the City has stated that they will spend an amount of \$720,000 of MFT funds for the purposes of maintaining streets. The program expenses will run from May 1, 2016 to April 30, 2017. A complete budget is included with your materials.

Fiscal Impact

The expenses planned for this year's MFT program are included in the FY 2017 Motor Fuel Tax Budget.

RE: Depot Construction Bid Award

Background

The City executed an agreement with IDOT for the construction phase of the Depot renovation project. In that agreement, a construction estimate of \$3.625M was outlined in the schedule of costs for the project. On Tuesday, bids were opened for the construction work related to the renovation. The City received two bids, one from Halverson Construction and the other from R.D. Lawrence Construction Company. Each bid was responsive and provided the necessary documentation. The solicited costs were as follows:

Analysis/Discussion

Both bids came in over the estimated construction cost. A discussion of the price occurred with IDOT's representatives at WSP|Parsons Brinckerhoff, and they are going to conduct some analysis and calculations to see if the construction agreement can be altered. Should the project be able to adjust the budget upward, the City's match portion may increase as well. By contract, the City's match portion cannot exceed 2% of the construction value, which makes the City's match a total of \$80,788. The amount will be adjusted due to non-reimbursed expenditures the City incurred throughout this project. Either way, the Capital Project budget included a \$100,000 matching contribution, which is over the projected contribution based on the bid value.

If the construction cost can be handled by the High Speed Rail fund, the intergovernmental agreement with the state will need to be altered to illustrate the amended contributions.

Fiscal Impact

The increased value of the project, per the contractor's bid, would increase the City's match for the project. However, this amount should not exceed what is budgeted in the FY 2017 Capital Improvement budget. The estimated contribution maximum should be \$80,788.

COW Recommendation

Place the bid award to R.D. Lawrence Construction Company in the amount of \$4,039,400 on the Council's July 5th agenda. Should IDOT's representatives determine that the High Speed Rail fund cannot support this construction total, the measure can be tabled until a resolution of the cost occurs.

Council Recommendation:

After receiving a confirmation from the State's representatives on the ability of the High Speed Rail fund to support the project, award the bid to R. D. Lawrence Construction Company in the amount of \$4,039,400.

RE: Acceptance of Cured in Place Pipe Project

Background

The City of Lincoln has numerous sewers that are in a dilapidated state. Problems consisting of root protrusion, broken piping, and offset joints lead to back ups and loss of system capacity throughout the community.

The neighborhood along the streets of Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, and Northbrooke Cr, between Woodlawn and 21st St, have had backups from localized flooding and root growth in the sewer mains.

Over the last 10 years, the sewer department has had to respond to these mains to perform cleaning and maintenance, far more often than what should be expected. When onsite, generally, we find that roots have collected rags, toilet paper, and other debris that have the sewer blocked.

Analysis/Discussion

To provide a more reliable service to the residents, the Sewer Department took a proactive approach to address the issue. Three methods were originally considered when developing a solution.

The first method was traditional excavation and pipe replacement. This was the most costly method investigated. Even though road repairs (which are the bulk of a sewer construction project) would be at a minimum, the sewers in these backyards had little access for equipment. Coupled with the fact that fences and sheds would need to be relocated, the various trees and shrubbery would be burdensome to deal with as well, driving the costs well beyond what we budgeted. Because of the access issue, we looked at trenchless rehabilitation of the mains.

The most popular trenchless technology is Cured in Place Pipe (CIPP) lining. This was discussed with the council during the meeting on June 20, 2016. While it does not allow for a repair of the connecting lateral to the sewer main, it does provide a long term solution to root infiltration and pipe integrity. Any section of pipe that has cracks in the clay would be fortified to prevent any collapse for many years to come, as well as seal off ground water infiltration.

The last method looked at was a flexible hydraulic grout that is pumped to seal any voids or imperfections in the joint of the clay pipe. The grout can be treated with herbicide to address future root growth. However, there is no structural integrity to this method. If the pipe were ever excavated for any reason, we would lose the seal as the grout chemically reacts with the soil.

The method that was selected to bid was CIPP.

In late 2015 and early 2016, the Sewer Department and the City Administrator worked with Farnsworth Group (F-W) to develop the bid specifications and go over the areas that the City was looking to target for rehabilitation. Approximately 6000 feet of sewers were selected to be bid. This includes the areas stated and a sewer main under the parking lot adjacent to Pekin Street that been the subject of improvement for several years.

On June 22, 2016, the City opened bids in regards to the project. Hoerr Construction, of Peoria, IL, was the apparent low, responsible bidder. Bid prices are as follows:

In addition to Hoerr, four other contractors placed bids on the project. Due to the limited number of companies that perform this type of work, the City was pleased to have 5 bids submitted. Of the five bids submitted, only one (Dillon) submitted a ultraviolet light cured material, the others chose thermally cured material.

The estimate for the project was \$222,375.00. With the project cost significantly under the estimate, there may be an opportunity to perform additional work in other problematic areas.

The funds for this project would come directly out of the sewer fund. The project was budgeted for FY 15-16. The funds were unused do to delays in the bid and changes in the project scope. In lieu of transferring funds into a newly created capital project account, the money was left in place for this year, knowing this project was in the works.

Approval of this project would provide a much needed, long term investment into the aging infrastructure of the City, as well as prevent future root issues that are being experienced.

COW Recommendation

Place acceptance of the Bid on the Council's June 28th agenda.

If the Work has been 50 percent completed as determined by Engineer, and if the character and progress of the Work have been satisfactory to Owner and Engineer, then as long as the character and progress of the Work remain satisfactory to Owner and Engineer, there will be no additional retainage; and
 - b. 90 percent of cost of materials and equipment not incorporated in the Work (with the balance being retainage).

~~B. Upon Substantial Completion, Owner shall pay an amount sufficient to increase total payments to Contractor to 95 percent of the Work completed, less such amounts as Engineer shall determine in accordance with Paragraph 14.02.B.5 of the General Conditions and less such amounts as Engineer shall determine in accordance with Paragraph 14.02B.5. of the General Conditions.~~

6.03 *Final Payment*

- A. Upon final completion and acceptance of the Work in accordance with Paragraph 14.07 of the General Conditions, Owner shall pay the remainder of the Contract Price as recommended by Engineer as provided in said Paragraph 14.07.

ARTICLE 7 – INTEREST

- 7.01 All moneys not paid when due as provided in Article 14 of the General Conditions shall bear interest at the maximum legal rate.

ARTICLE 8 – CONTRACTOR'S REPRESENTATIONS

- 8.01 In order to induce Owner to enter into this Agreement, Contractor makes the following representations:
 - A. Contractor has examined and carefully studied the Contract Documents and the other related data identified in the Bidding Documents.
 - B. Contractor has visited the Site and become familiar with and is satisfied as to the general, local, and Site conditions that may affect cost, progress, and performance of the Work.
 - C. Contractor is familiar with and is satisfied as to all federal, state, and local Laws and Regulations that may affect cost, progress, and performance of the Work.
 - D. Contractor has carefully studied all: (1) reports of explorations and tests of subsurface conditions at or contiguous to the Site and all drawings of physical conditions relating to

existing surface or subsurface structures at the Site (except Underground Facilities), if any, that have been identified in Paragraph SC-4.02 of the Supplementary Conditions as containing reliable "technical data," and (2) reports and drawings of Hazardous Environmental Conditions, if any, at the Site that have been identified in Paragraph SC-4.06 of the Supplementary Conditions as containing reliable "technical data."

- E. Contractor has considered the information known to Contractor; information commonly known to contractors doing business in the locality of the Site; information and observations obtained from visits to the Site; the Contract Documents; and the Site-related reports and drawings identified in the Contract Documents, with respect to the effect of such information, observations, and documents on (1) the cost, progress, and performance of the Work; (2) the means, methods, techniques, sequences, and procedures of construction to be employed by Contractor, including any specific means, methods, techniques, sequences, and procedures of construction expressly required by the Contract Documents; and (3) Contractor's safety precautions and programs.
- F. Based on the information and observations referred to in Paragraph 8.01.E above, Contractor does not consider that further examinations, investigations, explorations, tests, studies, or data are necessary for the performance of the Work at the Contract Price, within the Contract Times, and in accordance with the other terms and conditions of the Contract Documents.
- G. Contractor is aware of the general nature of work to be performed by Owner and others at the Site that relates to the Work as indicated in the Contract Documents.
- H. Contractor has given Engineer written notice of all conflicts, errors, ambiguities, or discrepancies that Contractor has discovered in the Contract Documents, and the written resolution thereof by Engineer is acceptable to Contractor.
- I. The Contract Documents are generally sufficient to indicate and convey understanding of all terms and conditions for performance and furnishing of the Work.

PART 1 GENERAL

1.1 RELATED DOCUMENTS

- A. Drawings and general provisions of Contract, including General Conditions, Special Provisions, and other Specification Sections, apply to this Section.

1.2 PROJECT DESCRIPTION

- A. It is the intent of this specification to provide for the rehabilitation of sewer lines by the installation of a continuous, tight fitting watertight pipe-within-a-pipe, extending from manhole to manhole. The work shall be accomplished by installing a cured-in-place pipe (CIPP) resin-impregnated flexible tube, into the existing sewer. When the flexible tube is held against the existing pipe using either hydrostatic or air pressure, the resin is thermally or UV cured.

1.2 SUMMARY

- A. The contractor shall conduct and schedule installation operations and cleanup activities in a manner to minimize the obstruction and inconvenience to traffic, pedestrians, businesses, property owners or tenants.
- B. The contractor shall take such precautions during construction to avoid the introduction of any material, product, compounds, or by-products to the sewers that may cause a blockage or interfere with the operations of the wastewater treatment plant.

1.3 SUBMITTALS

- A. GENERAL: Submit the following in accordance with Conditions of Contract and Division 1 Specification Sections:
 - 1. Submittals for fabric tube and resin system shall include:
 - a. Type of material and manufacturer to be used; including ASTM references, material composition, specifications, physical properties and chemical resistance and catalog data showing any clarifications and updates.

- b. Shop drawings and manufacturers' detailed description of the installation process to be used for the installation of the material. This will include the manufacturer's recommend mix design, additives and set times.

The CIPP shall be manufactured and installed in accordance with either ASTM F1216-05, Standard Practice for Rehabilitation of Existing Pipelines and Conducts by the Inversion and Curing of a Resin Impregnated Tube or by ASTM F1743-96 Standard Practice for Rehabilitation of Existing Pipelines and Conducts by the Pulled-In-Place Installation of Cured-in-Place Thermosetting Resin Pipe (CIPP), or in accordance with ASTM F-2019 (latest versions.)
 - g. Detailed description of field testing processes and procedures.
- B. Certification from manufacturer that the Contractor is an approved installer of the material or system. Certificates of training, issued by the manufacturer or an approved, independent third party organization, for each member of the contractor's crew.
- C. Current documentation, furnished by the manufacturer of the product being used, certifying that the Contractor's training; personnel and equipment fully comply with the manufacturer's Quality Assurance requirements.
- D. Contractor shall furnish five (5) verifiable references, indicating that the Contractor has successfully installed the same material as specified herein in a similar environment.
- E. Emergency response plan detailing the procedures to be used in the event of a pump or equipment failure, sewer overflow, service backup, sewage or chemical spill, traffic accident or emergency situations. The plan shall include emergency (24/7) contact numbers for the contractor, emergency responders, and equipment or material suppliers. Each of the contractor's crews shall maintain a copy of the emergency response plan on site at all times.

1.4 QUALITY ASSURANCE

3.2 UNSCHEDULED POINT REPAIRS

- A. If the pre-installation video of a sewer reveals that the sewer cannot be lined without the completion of unscheduled point repairs to the system, the Contractor will complete the necessary work at the contract unit price for each unscheduled sewer repair.

3.3 EXISTING MANHOLES

- A. Prior to the installation of the CIPP, the contractor shall install gasket waterstops in the interior circumference of the existing sewer at the upstream and downstream manholes of each CIPP. The waterstop, consisting of two rings of Hydrotite DDS-0420, 4 mm X 20mm, waterstop as manufactured by Greenstreak, shall be installed in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations.
- B. Any existing manhole that damaged during the installation of the CIPP, shall be restored at the Contractors expense.
- C. City has identified some existing manholes may have turn down fittings on the existing sanitary lines. Contractor to remove these fittings as necessary for cleaning, televising, and lining. Contractor shall reinstall turn downs at the end of the project, incidental to the project.

3.4 RESTORATION OF SEWER SERVICE

- A. After the CIPP has cured the Contractor shall reconnect, without excavation, all existing active laterals. Restoration shall be completed from within the sewer by means of a CCTV camera and remote control cutting device that re-establishes the connection to a the original opening to the satisfaction of the Owner. Sewer service bores shall be wire brush cleaned and de-burred to create a smooth edge between the service entrance and the CIPP Liner. Camera verification of this de-burring process is required.
- B. Service connection shall be paid for under the contract unit price of SERVICE LATERAL CONNECTION, EACH. Size of the lateral has no bearing on the price paid.

3.5 CONTRACTOR EXPERIENCE

- A. Current documentation, furnished by the manufacturer of the product being used, certifying that the Contractor's training; personnel and equipment fully comply with the manufacturer's Quality Assurance requirements.
- B. Contractor shall furnish five (5) verifiable references, indicating that the Contractor has successfully installed the same material as specified herein in a similar environment.

PART 4 QUALITY ASSURANCES

4.1 GENERAL

- A. All materials testing shall be performed by an approved, independent testing laboratory at the Contractor's expense. Samples shall be taken per inversion. Samples shall be taken in the presence of the Owner's representative and the results of the testing shall be forwarded directly to the Owner's representative. All tests shall be performed in accordance with the applicable ASTM standards.

- B. After the work is completed, including the restored service connections, the contractor shall provide the Owner's representative with a post-installation video. Any defects noted on this post-installation video inspection shall be corrected by the Contractor at his expense and the line re-inspected.

PART 5 MEASUREMENT and PAYMENT

- 5.1 Payment will be made for the actual length of cured-in-place-pipe installed, measured from centerline of manhole to centerline of manhole at the unit bid price. Any item not specified for payment will be considered as incidental to and included in the cost of the cured-in-place-pipe installation.

- 5.2 Payment of the Lump Sum bid price for mobilization will include all work associated installation of cured-in-place-pipe not otherwise measured for payment. This includes, but is not limited to, removal and replacement of the top sections of manholes (if necessary), surface restoration, preparation of the safety plan, permits, fees and licenses, testing, flow diversion, shop drawings, test samples, and the mobilization/demobilization of labor, equipment and materials to the job site.

SUMMARY AND BACKGROUND OF SUBJECT MATTER:

James E. Olguin of Goldstine, Skrodzi, Russian, Nemecek and Hoff, Ltd., on behalf of McDonald's USA, LLC, has filed a petition pursuant to Section 11-5-7 of the City Code for a Special Use in the C-1 and C-2 Districts to establish a drive-through restaurant facility at 1007 Hickox Drive. The site of the proposed drive-through McDonald's restaurant is the former Tropics restaurant.

ANALYSIS AND DISCUSSION

Current Zoning Classification of Subject Property: C-2, Service Retail

Current Use of the Subject Property: Vacant restaurant

Section 11-2-4, Special Use Standards for Decisions and Recommendations of the Plan Commission:

No Special use shall be recommended for approval by the Plan Commission unless there is a concurring vote of a majority of all members regarding findings of fact. Following are the findings of fact that the Special Use being requested must meet.

1. The establishment, maintenance, or operation of the Special Use will not be detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety, morals, comfort, or general welfare.
2. The Special Use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the purpose already permitted nor substantially diminish property values within the neighborhood.
3. The establishment of the Special Use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of the surrounding property for uses permitted in the district.

4. Adequate utilities, access roads, drainage or necessary facilities have been or will be provided.
5. Adequate measures have been or will be taken to provide ingress and egress so designed as to minimize traffic congestion in the public streets.
6. The Special Use is necessary for public convenience at this location.

Please review the attached Special Use Petition for explanation provided by the applicant as to how the proposed Special Use meets each of the required findings of fact.

Section 11-5-7, (A), Drive-Through Standards and Requirements:

In considering the issuance of a Special Use permit, the Plan Commission and the City Council shall consider the following, in addition to the other general standards for Special Uses detailed above:

1. **Number Of Lanes:** To minimize any negative impacts related to drive-through lanes or the potential for circulation conflicts, conflicts with vehicles entering or exiting the site, pedestrian conflicts, and the existing condition of relatively small commercial lot sizes located adjacent to a residential district, no more than one drive-through lane shall be permitted by special use permit in the C-1 or C-2 district where it abuts a residential district.
2. **Sufficient Stacking Space:** To establish safe stacking space, the following minimum stacking space required is: Four (4) vehicles at each bay window, ordering station or machine and does not obstruct the public right of way or interfere with the ingress or egress to the property.
3. **Location:** Drive-through facilities shall be prohibited from facing a public street. All drive-through facilities shall be located on the side or rear of the structure that is either facing the site's parking area or internal drive aisle.
4. **Interference:** There shall be no interference with the operations of other businesses or residential uses in the proximity of the drive-up facility.
5. **Other Matter or Information:** Any other matter or information determined to be relevant to the reasonableness of the proposed use. (Ord. 585, 1-20-2004; amd. Ord. 2014-808, 5-19-2014)

Upon consideration of the Special Use application at the June 23, 2016 Plan Commission meeting, the members of the Plan Commission found that the proposed Special Use for a drive-through restaurant use met all required findings of fact of City Code Section 11-2-4 and the drive-through standards and requirements of City Code Section 11-5-7, (A), and voted unanimously to recommend approval of the Special Use request.

FISCAL IMPACT

No direct fiscal impact on FY16/17 budget, but a new McDonald's restaurant has the potential to generate an increased level of sale tax revenue.


STAFF OBSERVATIONS AND RECOMMENDATION

Staff concurs with the evidence provided by the applicant and the findings and recommendation of the Plan Commission and feels that the proposed drive-through McDonald's restaurant use at 1007 Hickox Drive meets the required findings of fact and further, fully complies with the five standards that must be met for a drive-through facility. The request for Special Use authorization to establish a McDonald's drive thru restaurant use at 1007 Hickox Drive should be placed on the agenda for the regular City Council meeting on July 5, 2016 for final City Council consideration and approval.

SUMMARY AND BACKGROUND & ANALYSIS OF SUBJECT MATTER:

512 N. Monroe Street

The first property that is being recommended for fast track demolition under the FY 2016/2017 budget is 512 N. Monroe Street. The property at 512 N. Monroe Street has been chronically in violation of the City Code and several court judgments have been filed against James Dellinger, the owner of the property for his failure to comply with City maintenance standards. The home has been vacant for a few years and as photos included in the staff PowerPoint indicate, the property at 512 N. Monroe is in very poor condition, with holes and voids in the eave of the home and visible holes in the roof of the home, which have allowed raccoons and other vermin to enter the home. According to the County Treasurer's website and the findings of a title search, the property at 512 N. Monroe Street is owned by James D. Dellinger. A vacant home of this nature poses a serious danger to that neighborhood and is the type of dangerous building that should be addressed by the fast track demolition process.

The Building and Safety office has received two estimates for the demolition and restoration of the property at 512 N. Monroe Street and they are as follows:

Harold Goodman Inc.: \$4,300.00

Moody Excavating: \$4,800.00

Given that the estimate from Harold Goodman Inc. came in at \$500.00 less than the estimate from Moody Excavating, staff recommends that the fast track demolition of 512 N. Monroe Street be performed by Harold Goodman Inc. As a result of the City paying ahead to the Indian Creek Landfill at the end of FY2015/2016 to cover the dumping fees for future demolitions, the City currently has a credit balance of \$7,126.16, which will cover the expense for the dumping of the demolition material from 512 N. Monroe Street and the demolition of 1402 N. Kickapoo St. The dangerous building at 512 N. Monroe Street will be demolished at the end of July 2016, at the expiration of the mandatory, 30-day waiting period.

1402 N. Kickapoo Street

The second property that is being recommended for fast track demolition under the FY 2016/2017 budget is 1402 N. Kickapoo Street. The property at 1402 N. Kickapoo Street is comprised of a home that has been vacant for several years and a concrete block repair garage building at the rear of the property. The property at 1402 N. Kickapoo Street was formerly the location of a commercial repair garage operated by Raymond Burger. As the photos included in the staff PowerPoint indicate, the home at the property at 1402 N. Kickapoo Street is in very dilapidated condition, with boarded up windows, a collapsing roof structure and is a haven for animals and vermin. The repair garage building is also in poor condition and has been a site of illegal dumping of material over the years. According to the County Treasurer's website and the findings of a title search, the property at 1402 N. Kickapoo Street is currently owned by Richard Vonderheide Jr. An extremely dilapidated, vacant home and accessory building of this nature pose a serious danger to that neighborhood and are the types of dangerous buildings that should be addressed by the fast track demolition process.

The Building and Safety office has received two estimates for the demolition and restoration of the property at 1402 N. Kickapoo Street and they are as follows:

Harold Goodman Inc.: \$18,000

Moody Excavating: \$7,500

Given that the estimate from Moody Excavating came in at \$10,500.00 less than the estimate from Harold Goodman Inc., staff recommends that the fast track demolition of 1402 N. Kickapoo Street be performed by Moody Excavating. James Moody, the owner of Moody Excavating, submitted such a significantly lower bid to demolish the property as a community service gesture, as he resides a block the north and realizes the substantial benefit demolition of the dangerous property will result in for that entire neighborhood. The dangerous building at 1502 4th Street will be demolished at the end July 2016, at the expiration of the mandatory, 30-day waiting period.

RE: **2016 Roadway Resurfacing Project**

Background

Each year the Lincoln Street Department organizes a Roadway Resurfacing Project to improve and maintain city streets. These projects also enhance safety and provide a better experience for citizens and visitors as they travel through our city.

Joe Adams with Farnsworth Group Inc. is the engineer that oversees and provides recommendations for what treatments should be used on various streets. Mr. Adams also provides project cost estimates, specifications, and oversees the bidding process.

The streets targeted for resurfacing are chosen using the Five Year Roadway Capital Improvement Plan developed in 2012, roadway inspections by Street Department staff, and concerns brought forward by citizens.

Analysis/Discussion

For this year's resurfacing projects there is approximately \$530,000.00 dollars available. I would like the council to look at this year's resurfacing as two different projects. One being the oil and chip portion and second, a mill and overlay portion.

The 2016 Oil & Chip project is comparable to 2015 with a cost estimate of \$299,826.58. This project includes two different treatments to the roadways.

1. (A/1) - A basic oil and chip coating, this is when a thin layer of oil is applied to the roadway followed by a thin layer of rock to create a wear surface. This seals the roadway and prevents moisture from penetrating and causing damage.
2. (A/3) – The existing roadway is pulverized, regraded, and then compacted. A primer is then applied and allowed to dry. It is then followed by two layers of oil and chip. The first layer is often a larger stone, and the second, a finer stone to create a smoother driving surface. Often with this process repairs can be made to any base failures that exist.

The mill & overlay process involves milling the roadway to a certain depth then laying Hot Mix Asphalt back over the surface. One thing to note this is not considered normal maintenance as is oil and chip, therefore we are required to make all sidewalk ramps and curbs ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) compliant when this process is applied.

For the mill and overlay we had Farnsworth provide estimates in two different areas so the council has options for treatment.

One would be three blocks near the Depot. Resurfacing these streets would greatly enhance the Depot Restoration project and make it more complete. This project cost estimate was \$156,514.68. It included the following streets:

1. N. Chicago from Broadway St to Pekin
2. N. Sangamon from Broadway St. to Pekin
3. Pekin St. from Sangamon to N. Logan

If the council chose to complete the areas above along with the oil and chip program, we would be at a total cost of \$456,341.26 which is within budget. Potentially, we could add more oil and chip targets or complete another block around the Depot with the additional funds. The other area for consider action is seven blocks of Tremont St. between N. Sangamon to N. Union St.

1. N. Sangamon to N. Logan
2. N. Logan To N. Kankakee
3. N. Kankakee to N. Ottawa
4. N. Ottawa to College Ave.
5. College Ave. to Water
6. Water To Clay
7. Clay to Union

The cost estimate for all seven blocks listed above is \$658,326.86 which is not within our budget. The council could chose to limit the scope of the project too include one or two blocks.

The council should also look to approve a Work Order from Farnsworth in the amount of \$56,000 to implement the City's resurfacing program. This includes selection of streets, calculation of quantities, preparation of bid documents, and construction engineering. This amount is budgeted in FY 2017 MFT budget.

COW Recommendation

Place the 2016 Resurfacing program and Work Order on the Council agenda for July 5, 2016.

Council Recommendation:

Approval of the scope of the resurfacing projects to include the Oil & Chip portion and the Mill & Overlay of the three blocks around Depot.

Approval of the Work Order from Farnsworth in the amount of \$56,000 to oversee and implement the city's 2016 Resurfacing project. The funds are budgeted in FY 2017 MFT budget.
